Messages from the PGM and Festival Chairman >



I know a chap who runs 'ultra marathons'. He once asked me about my experiences in the army and how soldiers just keep going when they have to. His story was incredible; he ran a half-marathon which he enjoyed very much but felt he needed something a bit more challenging. So he signed-up for the 'Ultra-Trail du Mont-Blanc'; a gruelling 106 mile race around Europe's tallest mountain in which runners ascend and

descend about 33,000 feet. What could I tell this chap about endurance? The 'UTMB' must be completed within 46 hours. My friend was the last person to finish within the time allowed (apparently, the last one across the line gets a bigger cheer than the person who 'wins' the race) and although he was hospitalised by the blisters he acquired during the encounter, he kept signing up for more. He ran from Lands End to John O'Groats in 2016 (getting a blister in Bristol) but needed more than one attempt to complete the 145mile Grand Union Canal Race.


I shared a pretty lame experience. Being on exercise with the Royal Tank Regiment in the 1990's on the cold northern plains of Germany, we were regularly sleep-deprived and freezing cold. Long nights were the hardest but there were two things which would always help. Eating was first. When one is cold to the core and it does not matter how many layers you wear, eating anything will help; it's the metabolic equivalent of throwing a log on the fire. The next thing is washing -but in particular cleaning one's teeth! On exercise we usually looked like Victorian chimney sweeps, black from head to toe with oil, grime and mud. Days seem to be 26 hours long and there was no routine; no breakfast time, no rest breaks just relentless movement, maintenance, fighting and problem solving. To stop, eat and wash was to become human for a moment. Even if the surrounding environment had not changed- it was still cold, we were still tired and I was probably still lost- these small acts made a huge difference.

The marathon cliché when talking about fundraising for a festival is trite, but also well used; we are about 70 miles into our ultra marathon, over half way but with the hardest part to complete. Of course we're feeling the odd blister and in need of a rest, but we need to keep going.

On my friend's second attempt to complete the Grand Union Canal Race, he attributed a small advantage to a mental trick he used on himself after our chat. At a point in the race when he was feeling particularly drained and unsure if he could carry on, he promised himself that in 5 miles he would brush his teeth! He spent 5 miles looking forward to this simple chore, as those miles fell away, he duly brushed his teeth as he ran. He spent the next 5 miles enjoying the experience of a fresh mouth and with 10 more miles more behind him he found a renewed sense purpose and was that bit closer to his goal, which of course he achieved. So, brethren, with regard to our own marathon Festival29, consider what might be your equivalent of an oily 'egg banjo' sandwich (a tank crewman's favourite), a shave or a teeth-clean. Pick a small target, hit it and enjoy the feeling knowing you're closer to the finish line.



Festival 29 Jewels – Four More Can Keep Us on Target

As we approach the midway point of Festival 29, now is the moment to refocus our efforts and maintain the strong momentum already achieved. Regular giving remains the most effective and sustainable way to support the Festival. By committing to a small monthly donation, members not only contribute steadily to the appeal but also receive a Festival Jewel a visible symbol of commitment, pride, and shared purpose.

Four more members per lodge. A simple target

A Few Words on the Road I've Been Travelling

Some of you will know that, as part of supporting the Masonic Charitable Foundation through the Suffolk Masonic Festival 29, I set myself a bit of a challenge: to visit one lodge in every province under the United Grand Lodge of England. I'm pleased to say I've now attended lodges in 21 of the 47 provinces, and it's been an amazing experience.

Everywhere I've gone, the history and tradition of the Craft really stands out. You walk into a lodge you've never visited before, yet it instantly feels familiar. Different buildings, different customs perhaps and sometimes, a different ritual... (you should visit Bristol sometime), but you will find the same values, and the same spirit.

One of the best parts has been meeting new friends. I've been made welcome in every province without exception. A handshake at the door, a chat over the festive board, and before you know it, you feel among friends. It reminds you just how strong our brotherhood really is.

It does all take a fair bit of time and planning—choosing lodges, organising travel, and fitting it around everyday life—but it's more than worth it. Those journeys also give plenty of time for a bit of contemplation, especially about why we support our charities and the real difference that support makes.

If I've learned anything from this journey, it's given me a greater understanding of the Craft. Seeing Freemasonry at work across the country reinforces that what we do really matters—not just to us, but to the people and communities the MCF helps every day.

I have also learned a great deal about making videos. You can get a glimpse of my travels on my YouTube Channel.





Court Knoll Lodge's Cashless Alms Trial Delivers 25% Donation Boost

Court Knoll Lodge has successfully completed a trial of a cashless alms collection system, reporting overwhelmingly positive results and a notable 25% increase in donations compared with a traditional cash collection.

The initiative designed to modernise charitable giving within the lodge replaced physical cash with pledged donations. Members made their pledges on slips during the normal alms collection, but instead of placing cash into the bag, they later completed their donation through a web link or QR code that transferred funds directly into the lodge's Relief Chest.

Objections were overcome with simple solutions.

Early concerns centred around two main issues:

1. Whether older or less tech-confident members could participate, and
2. Whether the traditional feeling of an alms collection would be lost.

According to lodge officers, both concerns were quickly resolved. The physical alms collection was retained exactly as normal, preserving tradition, while members without electronic giving capability were simply assisted—handing cash to another brother who completed the digital donation on their behalf, ensuring the gift was still recorded under their own name.

Significant administrative and financial benefits

The trial highlighted several advantages for both the lodge and the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF):

- Zero administrative cost for the MCF, thanks to funds entering the Relief Chest system automatically.
- Elimination of failed Gift Aid envelopes - around 6% of paper envelopes normally fail, resulting in lost tax benefit.
- Substantial reduction in workload for the Charity Steward, who no longer needs to count cash, complete forms, or pay in donations.
- Greater transparency, as pledges recorded during the meeting allow the Secretary to know immediately how much has been raised, while the Charity Steward simply verifies the funds as they arrive in the Relief Chest.

A strong case for lodges considering the switch

Perhaps the most compelling result was the 25% increase in total giving, achieved with a similar attendance to a typical meeting an early indication that cashless pledging may encourage greater generosity.

Lodges across Suffolk considering a move to cashless collections are encouraged to seek guidance from Provincial Charity Steward Jon Neill, who is available to support any transitions and answer practical questions.

With smoother administration, reduced costs, and a measurable boost in charitable income, Court Knoll Lodge's experience suggests that going cashless offers clear and immediate benefits to the Craft.

MCF and Charitable Giving > An update from Nick Moulton

MCF and Charitable Giving:

There are significant changes in hand as to how money passes from the Brethren to those that require our assistance.

Festivals will continue and MCF will remain the initial recipient of the money raised.

Direct Grants

MCF will continue to provide funds for making direct grants and this process remains unchanged.

Anyone can make a direct application to the MCF for a grant, this includes individual Masons, Lodges, non-masonic charities.

These applications are referred back to the Province for comment, so it is best to liaise with us as a first step.

All of these grants comes from MCF funds and is not connected with the funds sent to the province.

It will remain as an key source for obtaining financial assistance.

New Community Fund

This is a new MCF scheme to enable provinces to seek and obtain larger amounts of money for registered charities operating within our provincial borders.

The idea is that larger donations will have a greater benefit for the recipients and draw more attention to charitable giving by Freemasons.

In 2026-27 the fund will be £2m per year. One application can be made per province per year with a limit of £50,000. There are 47 provinces participating in the scheme so the chances of a successful application will be good.

Suffolk Provincial Charitable Giving:

Provincial Match Funding

The changes set out above have brought the MCF match funding scheme to an end. This will be continued at province level which has enable the development of a more flexible approach, meaning that smaller grants can be given and can provide support for 'good causes' as well as registered charities. The 2025-26 funding is £10,000, which is nearly exhausted but will be refreshed shortly.

Festival Funded Provincial Grants

With effect from April 2026 25% of all monies raised from Festival giving will be automatically credited to the Provincial Relief Chest for distribution locally. This will be managed by the Provincial Charity team.

Applications are to be made to the Provincial Charity Steward. Further detail on the application process will be explained during the face to face local meeting that have been arranged for early March 2026, when Jon Neill & Nick Moulton will be available to explain how the applications process works in practice.

Summary

The above initiatives are intended to empower local Masons to help locally. The MCF is too remote to know which cause deserves help, so funds are being made available to provinces to respond more quickly and guide MCF where larger sums are required or more targeted giving is needed.

This returns some of the power of giving to the grass roots, we hope that the wider membership will recognise the significance of these changes and respond by identifying good causes that deserve our help, particularly those which have the added aspect community engagement, where it is not only money that is needed.

The Suffolk Masonic Charity, which has been operating for ten years across the province, held its final event for 2025 at Hintlesham Lakes. Eighteen young men from Langham Oaks School attended the countryside and fishing experience day, each receiving one-to-one tuition.

The day started early at 7 a.m. with our Provincial Charity Steward's alarm sounding - meaning only one thing... off to the lakes! As always, I found myself wondering, *why do I do this?*

The team began assembling, setting up gazebos and cookers ready to fire up. With food supplied and cooked by Alan Leeder Butchers, everyone - helpers and casters alike - started the day with a well-earned bacon roll.



By 9:30, the school arrived in cars and a minibus, with teachers and even the headmaster joining us for the day. More children than ever before wanted to take part this time. Some of the boys, remembering their casters from previous events, asked eagerly, "Can I fish with the same man again?"

The day unfolded as these events always do - with camaraderie, laughter, good-natured teasing, and mutual respect between the boys and the casters. Many of these children find it difficult to engage with strangers or new situations, yet they feel completely at ease with us - and we absolutely love having them join in.

Fish were few and far between, but most of the boys managed to catch something. Once again, the day was a great success, building bonds and friendships between Masonic and non-Masonic fishermen alike, and strengthening our ties with the local community.

By 1 p.m., it was time for lunch - once again cooked by our own chef, Alan - and thoroughly enjoyed by everyone. Soon after came the awards ceremony, attended by Graham Saward, Master of SIM, who kindly sponsored the event with a £500 donation. Graham thanked everyone and presented certificates and medals to all participants, including Bob, who won the prize for the biggest fish. The day ended with a few kind words from the school, lots of happy children, and cheerful waves goodbye - until next time.

On the way home, we received a message from one of the teachers. It read:

"Hello Jon, what a wonderful day! The lads didn't stop talking about it all the way home. When we arrived back at school, they proudly showed their certificates to staff and fellow pupils. A huge thank you to you and your team - you all treated the boys with absolute respect, something these brilliant lads don't often experience. Thank you again."

And that, I think, answers the question of *why we do this* - to give something back to those less fortunate, to those who struggle and as a simple act of kindness.

These are young lads just starting out in life. Maybe one day they'll look at Freemasonry a little differently - and who knows, perhaps even become the next members of our lodges.

How to sign up for a Jewel >

The main charge in the arms of our jewel is the sun rising over the sea. Suffolk is the most easterly County in England and thus the first to see the sun rise. The sun also refers to a poem by Michael Drayton, written in 1627, and was also used as the badge of Suffolk at the battle of Agincourt.

Entitlement to wear the jewel depends on the level of donation pledged:

Steward

£300 donation over the period of the festival (£5 per month).

Vice Patron

£600 donation over the period of the festival (£10 per month).

Patron

£900 donation over the period of the festival (£15 per month).

Grand Patron

£1200 donation over the period of the festival (£20 per month).

If you choose a level but exceed it you will get an upgrade and a free new bar. If you do not want to be seen to give more, you don't have to wear your upgrade bar, meaning we could all wear the same Jewel.

The payment can be made in one lump sum, or by setting up a direct debit for the appropriate sum, or by pledging to make the appropriate payment by other regular means.

You can make a regular monthly donation over the period of the festival; a single donation to cover the cost of your preferred jewel; or download a form to do either of these options if you prefer - simply by clicking here:

Once the appropriate sum is pledged, the jewel will be dispatched - please speak to your Charity Steward or direct to Roger Cawston on roger.cawston@talk21.com, who will arrange delivery of jewel for you.

Lodge Grand Patronage >

For lodges that match or exceed the amount raised at the last festival, Lodge Grand Patronage for the lodge is achieved, a gift and presentation will be made and Grand Patronage recognition from the PGM at the Provincial Grand Lodge Meeting. It is hoped that all Jewels are given out in lodge by the Charity Steward or the WM to add some weight to the fact these are an honorific and worn with pride at supporting our Festival. It will also highlight the Jewel to others and may promote participation.

Please also ensure all new members are informed and given the chance to set up the direct debit to obtain a Jewel, the time for payment can be extended beyond the Festival if needed. Jewels should only be worn when attending Meetings of Craft Lodges and RA Chapters within our own Province, and not when attending meetings of Grand Lodge or Lodges and Chapters in other Provinces.

We have not set expected upper or lower targets for lodges; it is entirely up to individual Lodges and Chapters as to how much they raise, but please start early to maximise the effect of the very good interest rate of the relief chest.

We will be issuing quarterly statistics showing how each Lodge and Chapter is doing on a per-capita basis.
